## *Caldwell College Introduces First Doctoral Program in Applied Behavior Analysis*

**O**n July 29, 2009, Caldwell College was granted approval to offer the first Ph.D. program in Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) in the state of New Jersey by the Commission on Higher Education. The program was also the first doctoral program in the College's 70-year history. The new Ph.D. program was developed as a result of the increasing demand for professionals in leadership positions and as practitioners of ABA, particularly for the education and treatment of individuals with autism and related disabilities.

Autism is a serious developmental disorder that affects a child's ability to communicate, form relationships with others, and to respond appropriately to his or her surroundings. Typically appearing before age 3, the disorder occurs approximately four times more often in boys than girls. Once believed to be extremely rare, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) report that as many as 1 in 150 individuals in the USA may have the disorder. More alarming, however, is that New Jersey has the highest prevalence of autism for any state in the country, with about 1 of every 94 children being diagnosed.

When a child receives the diagnosis of autism, parents often turn to Board Certified Behavior Analysts, professionals who are trained in ABA. Over 40 years of well-designed,

peer-reviewed research studies have demonstrated the effectiveness of this science-based approach to learning for individuals with autism.

ABA has been shown to produce major gains in a child's social, communication, self-care, leisure, and academic skills. In fact, as much as 50% of children enrolled in well-designed and intensive ABA programs may learn to such an extent that they no longer meet the formal diagnosis of autism. Behavior analysts break tasks to be learned into smaller, more easily learned components. Frequent positive feedback and rewards are given as each child progresses in his or her skill development. To assess the effectiveness of the interventions used, the achievement of each child's learning goals is tracked and recorded.

In 2005, Caldwell College began to offer its popular Master of Arts in ABA program. Since its inception, over 45 graduates have gone out and applied their knowledge and skills in ABA to help those with autism and related disorders. "Although every new professional helps," notes Dr. Sharon Reeve, who directs the new Ph.D. program at Caldwell College, "there are such long waiting lists for ABA services that we have struggled to meet the demand. There is also a very real shortage of qualified professionals who are trained to assume leadership positions and to develop and oversee school programs

for autism." This need for leaders in the field of ABA and autism treatment resulted in numerous requests that the College make the next logical step and begin a doctoral program.

At the end of August, the first doctoral students in Caldwell College's history sat down for their first class in the 45-credit Ph.D. program. After nearly two years of development, the new Ph.D. program continues the College's commitment to scholarly research in behavior analysis and evidence-based treatment for autism. Designed for applicants who have already completed their master's degree in behavior analysis or a related field, the program includes coursework in both basic and applied behavior analysis as well as research and practicum experiences. The Ph.D. culminates in a dissertation research project that will provide students with an opportunity to make significant scholarly contributions to the field.

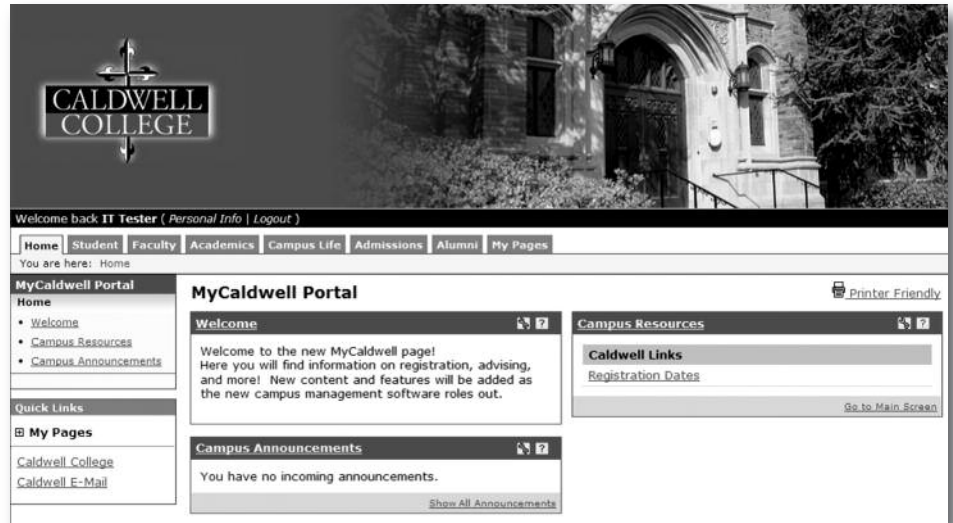

### ■ Financial Aid

The Office of Financial Aid encourages students enrolled in 6 credits or more to apply for financial aid. The first step is to apply or request a duplicate PIN number at [www.PIN.ed.gov](http://www.PIN.ed.gov). Once the PIN is received complete the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** by going to [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). The FAFSA application is not automatically renewed; **you must re/apply each year, after January 1st**. The renewal FAFSA for the 2009-2010 school year is **DUE by June 1st 2009 if you received a New Jersey Tuition Aid Grant in 2008-2009**. All other

**applicants are due October 1st 2009, for fall and spring terms, March 1st 2010, for spring term only.**

Students applying for the Federal financial aid program should remember that you must be enrolled in a minimum 6 credits to be eligible to receive federal financial aid (6 credits is half-time). **The Office of Financial Aid and/or State may request additional information when processing your FAFSA, so please respond to all inquires in a timely manner.**

**FAFSA is no longer available in the Office of Financial Aid. The NJ Department of Education has stopped disbursement of the paper application to schools. A student may request a paper application by calling 1-800-433-3243.**

There are regional and national scholarships that are available to adult students, for more information please stop by the Office of Financial Aid and review our scholarship book or you can register with a free scholarship search Web site, like fast-web, at [www.fastweb.com](http://www.fastweb.com).

If you are enrolled in only 3 credits the Office of Financial Aid has information on aid that you may be eligible for. *(continued on page 4)*

## Educational Administration

### Caldwell College Graduate Students Report Study Results to State Group

Over past years, study teams from Caldwell College have examined



issues or problems identified by several local school districts, such as Bloomfield, Caldwell/West Caldwell, Montclair, the Archdiocese of Newark, and the Paterson diocese. This year's study team examined an issue of interest to the members of the NJ Board of Professional Teaching Standards (NJBPTS). With the approval and cooperation of the Higher Education Division of the State Education Department, the team completed their study of Professional Learning Communities. Professional Learning Communities, also referred to as PLCs, operate under the assumption that the key to improved learning for students is continuous job-embedded learning for educators.

On Friday, June 12, the Caldwell College study group presented their findings to the NJBPTS as a part of their regular meeting in Trenton. Dr. Christopher Campisano, Coordinator of Higher Education, invited the team to make their presentation to that important committee of statewide educators. The meeting was also attended by Dr. Jay Doolan, Assistant Commissioner of Education. Leah Fanning, a special education teacher with 6 years of experience, lead the study team's presentation to the 16 member board. Highlighting the report was the recognition that students whose schools reflected a high number of traits associated with identification as a PLC demonstrated much higher State test scores than their counterparts at a similar socio-economic

level and far outstripped the norm for student performance in language arts/literacy, mathematics, and science. Schools were contacted nationwide, while the study focused on several New Jersey schools that evidenced the aforementioned PLC characteristics. A charter school within a large urban district in New Jersey was also included in the research with similarly impressive student academic performance, despite the lower socio-economic background of its students. The State committee members were pleased to receive the group's findings and applauded the study's content and the students' efforts. Dr. Joan Moriarty, assistant professor of education at Caldwell College, guided the students through the study and maintained communication with State officials.

Dr. John McIntyre, former coordinator of the Educational Administration program, praised the work of Dr. Moriarty and her graduate students: Patricia Clark, Leah Fanning, Ryan Kelly, Sr. Maurice Liguori, and Jenna Russo. "These students and Dr. Moriarty, their faculty mentor, worked extremely hard to provide these useful findings to the State Board of Professional Teaching Standards. Their preparation throughout the master's program has engaged them in the real world of problem-based research", McIntyre asserted. The Board appreciated the diligent effort of the Caldwell College representatives and the skillful manner of their presentation.

Government Post 9/11 GI Bill and Yellow Ribbon GI Education Enhancement Program (Yellow Ribbon Program) took effect on August 1, 2009. The Post 9/11 GI Bill is a new and generous education benefit program for individuals who served on active-duty in the U.S. Armed Forces on or after September 11, 2001. The new GI Bill provides for eligible veterans' tuition and fees, with the maximum benefit pegged to the highest undergraduate, resident tuition rate in a given state, plus a monthly housing allowance and an annual \$1,000 stipend for books. The VA has received over 140,000 applications for Post 9/11 GI Bill benefits so far and anticipates about a quarter of a million veterans will benefit from the newly expanded GI Bill by 2011.

Many colleges, including Caldwell College, will benefit from the new Bill. "We've certainly received an increasing number of calls and such from veterans who plan on utilizing the Post 9/11 benefits," said Caldwell College Center for Graduate & Continuing Studies Admission Counselor, Tom Disch. "Caldwell College is a military-friendly college and we look forward to serving an increasing number of veterans." Disch works closely with Vince Zelizo, the College's Veterans Certifying Official at the Office of Financial Aid, to help veterans transition to Caldwell College.

Furthermore, Caldwell College has entered an agreement with the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs to

provide a 50 percent match of tuition for established charges through the Yellow Ribbon Program to allow qualified Post 9/11 veterans to attend the College tuition free. The Yellow Ribbon Program is available to veterans who have served at least 36 months of active-duty after September 10, 2001.

The center will also

serve as a site for cutting edge research into both basic and applied principles of behavior."
